

VEGETABLE COMPANION PLANTING CHART

Common vegetable pairings for a home garden

Vegetable	Good Companions	Use Caution / Avoid	Notes
Tomatoes	basil, onions, garlic, carrots, marigolds, asparagus	cabbage-family crops, fennel, potatoes	needs support; allow airflow
Peppers	basil, onions, garlic, carrots, marigolds, oregano	fennel, kohlrabi	warm-season crop; provide full sun
Cucumbers	dill, nasturtiums, beans, radishes, marigolds	potatoes, aromatic herbs (sage, rosemary)	sprawling vine; needs support
Carrots	onions, leeks, chives, lettuce, peas	dill (can stunt growth)	loose soil for best root growth
Beans	corn, cucumbers, squash, marigolds, nasturtiums	onions, garlic, fennel	fixes nitrogen; use support for climbing types
Lettuce	carrots, radishes, beets, chives, strawberries	parsley (can inhibit growth)	cool-season crop; keep evenly moist
Squash	nasturtiums, marigolds, beans, corn, radishes	potatoes, aromatic herbs (sage, rosemary)	sprawling vine; needs space
Cabbage-Family Crops (broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, kale)	onions, garlic, celery, herbs (dill, chamomile), nasturtiums	strawberries, tomatoes, peppers	cool-season crop; allow airflow
Peas	carrots, radishes, lettuce, turnips, cucumbers	onions, peppers, garlic	cool-season crop; needs support
Corn	beans, squash, pumpkins, nasturtiums, sunflowers	tomatoes (may reduce yield)	plant in blocks for best pollination

Use as a general guide. Always follow spacing and sunlight needs.
